Nursing has always been linked to the idea of care and nurturing. Since Florence Nightingale, considered the precursor of modern nursing, understood care as... as a practice that involves technical actions and attitudes of commitment to the well-being of others (Silva, 2025). In Brazil, the creation of the National Humanization Policy (PNH) in 2003 represented an important milestone in strengthening humanized care within the Unified Health System (SUS). This policy established guidelines aimed at valuing relationships between humans in the workplace, promoting active listening and participation, and active participation of patients and families in the care process. From this milestone, the Hospital institutions were encouraged to adopt practices that respected the subjectivity and autonomy of users.
